Cover Photos By Reinald D. "Rex" Gill (1899-), An accomplished photographer, explorer and writer. Born in Christ Church, New Zealand he moved to Steamboat Springs (1918) where he built a house on the hill east of the Husky Station. His first love was exploring the canyonlands before they became national parks, and pioneering white water river runs. National magazines applauded the quality of his scenic pictures which were taken with a Speed Graphic camera and developed in a darkroom built in an old car chassis. At age 62 Gill made his last hiking expedition and moved his trailer-home to Gateway, Colorado where he continues to write with enviable memory and literary style.
