There were only a families living at Liberty Bell at that time. They had 3 children. Kay was youngest and was born at the American Legion Hospital. Father brought her mother down on a sleigh for her birth. They lived at the Liberty Bell until sister and brother were ready to start school and then moved to Telluride.
