Time Names & Places Subjects covered

- 21-61 History of parents and their arrival in Telluride in Telluride in 1913. Names siblings and place of birth. Family travelled to Greeley and back by train.
- 61-104 Lou Long, J. Adams, Remine Speaks of houses family lived in. Talks about various ethnic groups in town. Remembers Lou Long as delivery man.
- 120-170 Describes 1914 flood. His family lived across the river at that time. Mud and debris from flood filled back of fathers store. Describes houses that were tipped over in flood.
- 170-192 J. Adams Names various businesses in town. John Adams owned several different businesses. Milk was purchased from dairy at San Miguel.
- 192-202 He climbed hills to collect columbines to sell to miners, who gave them to their ladies in the Red Light District. Speaks of the Red Light District.
- 202-260 Miss Hamless, Van Atta Attended some early school years here. Names teachers he had. School memories. Students wore nickers to school and were required to dress up. Describes classrooms.
- 260-317 Memories of July 4th celebrations—rock drilling contest, kids races. Winter activities included ice skating, sledding, early home made skis. Describes skates they use. Summer activities included hiking, swimming and baseball games. Baseball teams travelled to Ouray, to compete, by wagon.
- 317-336 Lou Long Describes riding the train to Denver and also to Durango. Story of Lou Longs family. Tim had pneumonia when he was young. Family had a telephone. Father owned his own mortuary the last year they lived here. Speaks of mothers household chores.
- 366-400 Father was elected County Coroner for 2 years. Stories of his fathers duties during snow slides and train accidents. Describes sled and wagons in winter and pack trains to Tomboy mine.
